3. **Inclement Weather Response**: For the 2026 summer inclement weather season for heat and smoke, the City of Tacoma is partnering with Tacoma Libraries, outreach teams (contracted and non-contracted), and volunteers to ensure that unsheltered individuals have access to water and masks, information about cooling centers, and sheltering throughout the city. The City has ensured there is sufficient water available at the stability site for pickup and that our partners are prepared to supply resources accordingly.

During the week of August 3, 2026, there were 6 days that had a combination of either a threshold of moderate levels of heat and/or a higher Air Quality Index (AQI). The City focused on equipping day centers and outreach teams with supplies to support the unsheltered individuals and opened extended hours of our day/overnight shelters.

For Heat, the threshold for activation is according to the [National Weather Service Heat Risk Index](#):

- **Moderate levels of heat** that affects most individuals sensitive to heat, especially those without effective cooling and/or adequate hydration. The City will work with providers and volunteers to pass out supplies and supporting day centers.
- **Major and extreme levels of heat** that affects anyone without effective cooling and/or adequate hydration.

The City will continue to pass out supplies and work with our providers to expand daytime and overnight sheltering. *The City pauses non-emergent encampment removals from public property and City rights-of-way during inclement weather events that meet this threshold during extended overnight highs.*

For Air Quality, the thresholds for activations are established by the [World Health Organization](#) (WHO):

- **AQI “Orange” level 101–150, Unhealthy for Sensitive Groups:** The City will coordinate with partners and outreach teams to distribute supplies (including N95 mask) and will provide outreach coordination.
 - **AQI “Red” level 151–200, Unhealthy for All Groups:** The City will continue to pass out supplies and work with our providers to expand daytime and overnight sheltering. *The City pauses non-emergent encampment removals from public property and City rights-of-way during inclement weather events that meet this threshold.*
4. City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance: The City posts weekly information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current census, number of available beds, and exits to housing. **This information can be found at:** <https://cms.tacoma.gov/ncs/weeklydataupdate.pdf> and is updated weekly.
- Pierce County Human Services also uses the Homeless Management Information System to report daily availability throughout Pierce County. This information can be found at: <https://www.piercecountywa.gov/8220/Homeless-Emergency-Shelter-Availability> and shows the available beds open at shelters and is updated Monday - Friday by 10:00 a.m.
5. Encampment Outreach: For the week of **July 27 – 31, 2026**, HEAL team visited **16 different locations**. This resulted in **39 (25 new, and 14 repeat)** individuals contacted and referred to community services. Additionally, from last week’s outreach, 15 people were interested in shelter specific services; 5 individuals were placed into shelter and HEAL will continue to work with 10 more individuals to find available shelter beds that best meet the individual’s needs. - Tips from the Tacoma Fire Department on Recognizing Heat Illness: Summer's not over, yet! **Hot weather can be dangerous, especially for older adults, young children, people with certain medical conditions, and outdoor workers.** Do you know how to recognize the signs of heat illness? Signs of heat exhaustion (try to cool the person down):
 - Dizziness or weakness
 - Excessive sweating
 - Nausea, vomiting
 - Rapid, weak pulse
 - Muscle crampsSigns of heat stroke (call 911 or get the person immediate medical attention):
 - Headache, confusion
 - No sweating (even in the heat)
 - Body temperature above 103°F
 - Nausea, vomiting
 - Rapid, strong pulse
 - Loss of consciousness

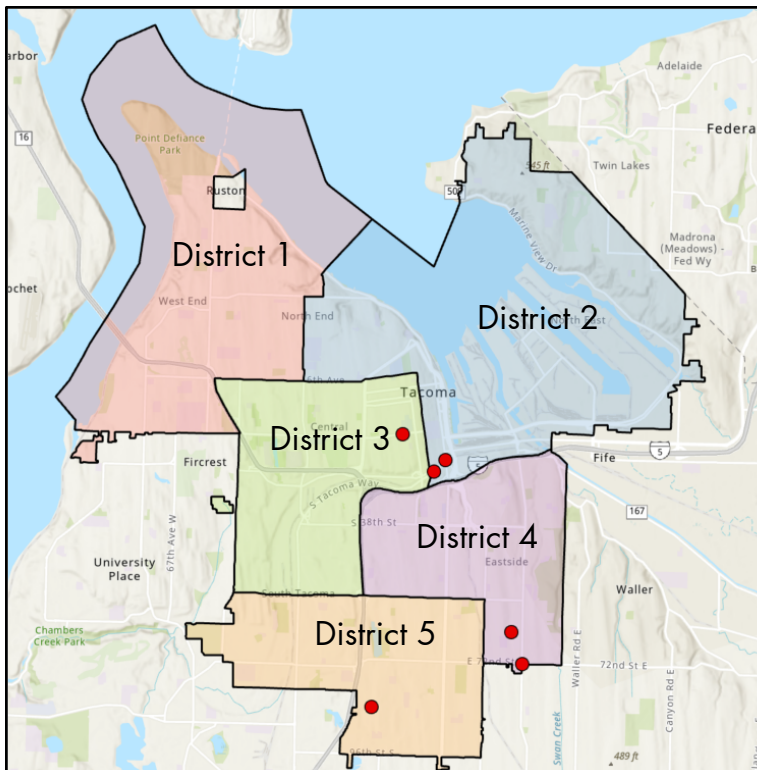

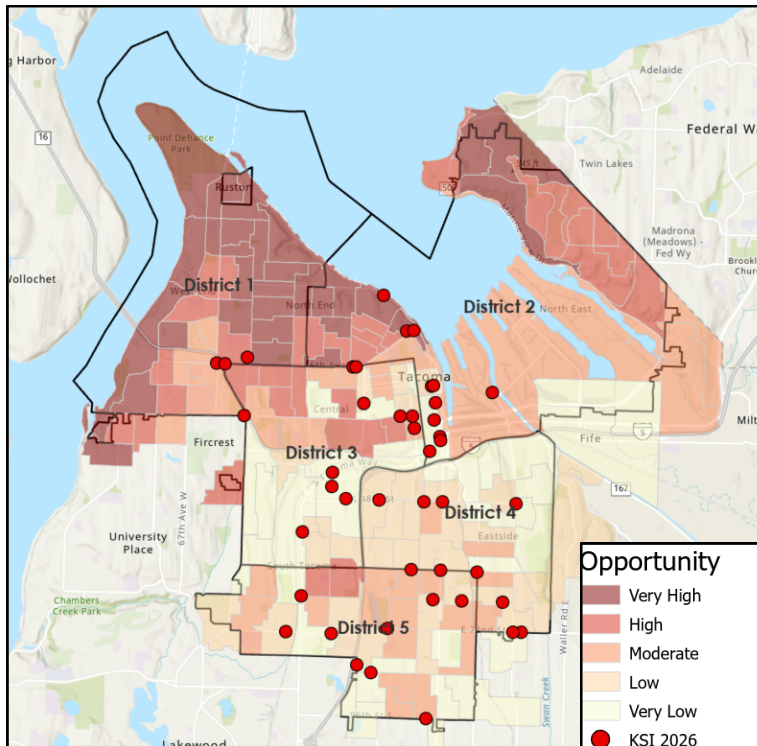

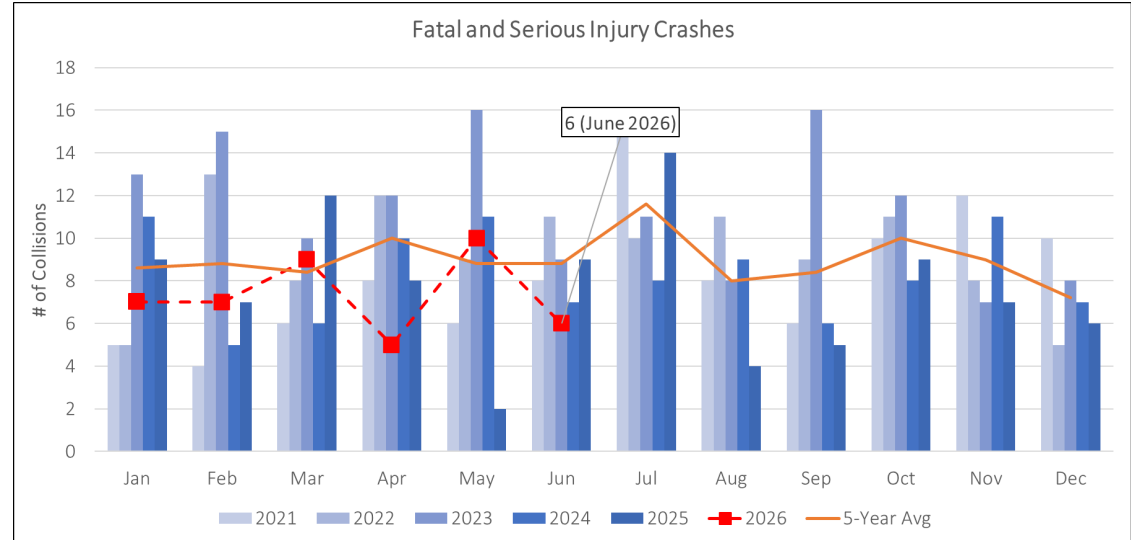

Quarter 2 | Data Snapshot

Introduction

This Quarterly update provides a high-level overview of Home in Tacoma activity for Quarter 2 of 2026 (April 1, 2026-June 30, 2026). Home in Tacoma is the City's citywide zoning reform, effective February 1, 2025, that replaced single-family zoning with Urban Residential zones to expand housing choice.

These reports aim to answer the following questions:

- What changes in applications are we seeing since Home in Tacoma took effect?
- Did zoning reform change what is being built?
- Where is new development happening in Tacoma?

Data Methodology

The data presented reflects a high-level view of Home in Tacoma activity within the new Urban Residential zones. To best understand the way this data was analyzed, please note the following:

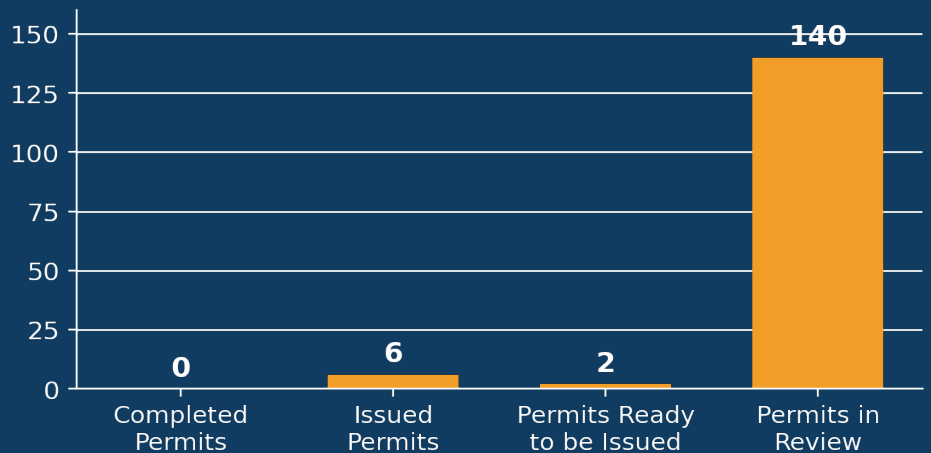
- Permit application data (in review, issued, and completed) was used instead of only completed housing units because it provides a more holistic picture of development activity. (A limited number of projects were completed in year one).
- The dataset captures both residential and commercial permits associated with housing units.
- HIT zoning includes parcels with overlapping or legacy zoning designations, which may include some commercially zoned sites.
- Permit and unit counts are presented separately because one permit may include multiple units. Units per permit serves as an indicator of development intensity.
- Zoning changes are applied citywide, but development activity may be unevenly distributed due to market conditions, parcel characteristics, and feasibility.
- Housing type definitions have changed under Home in Tacoma, which may result in differences when comparing to historical data or prior reports.
- Differences in methodology (e.g., application vs. issued permits, classification updates, or timing of implementation) may result in variation from other reports.



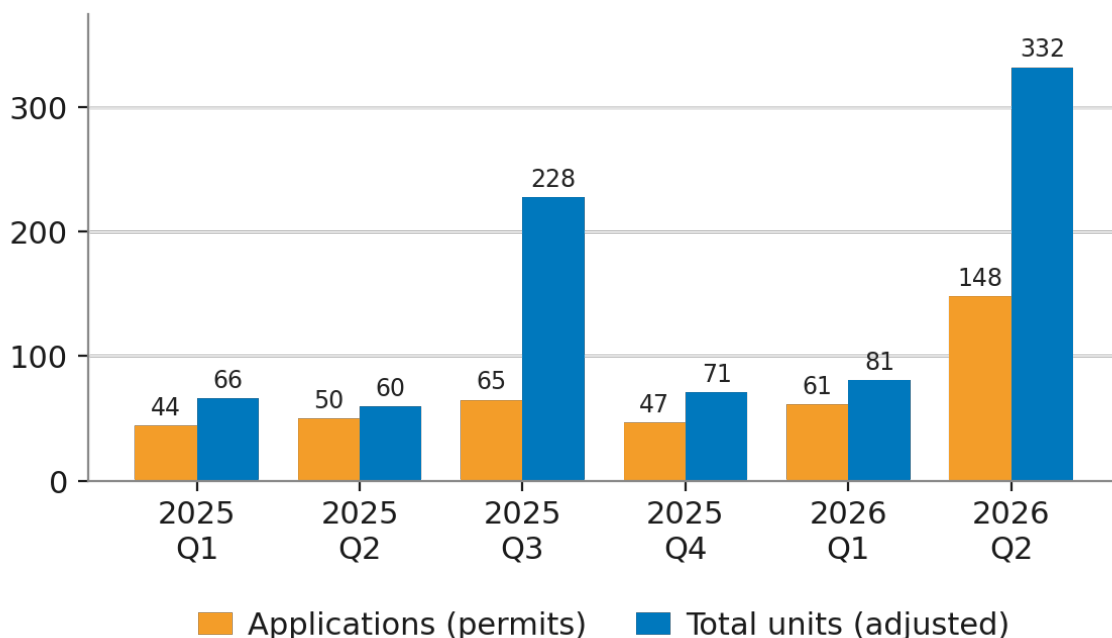
What changes are we seeing since Home in Tacoma took effect?

The number of applications and units has increased since the zoning change. In Q2 2026, there were **148 permit applications** for **332 housing units**, the strongest quarter yet. Most Permits applied for in Q2 are **still early in the pipeline** (issued, ready, or in review), which is expected given the length of the permitting and construction process.

Number of Permits by Status (Q2 2026)



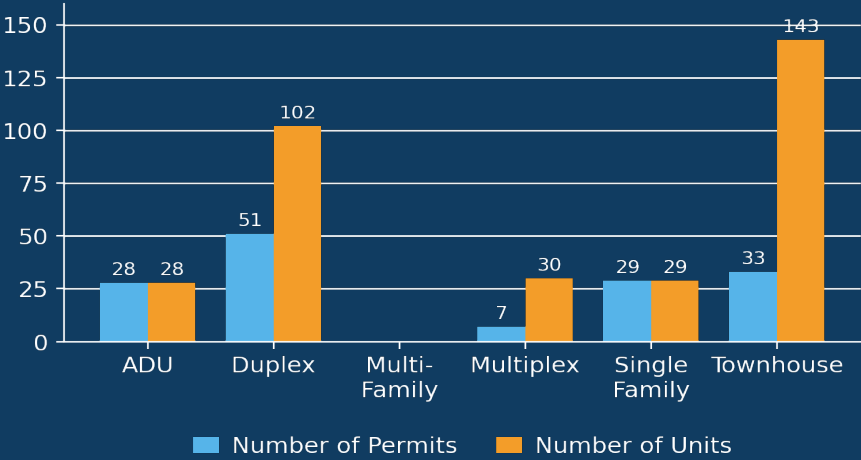
Applications & Units by Quarter (since HIT)



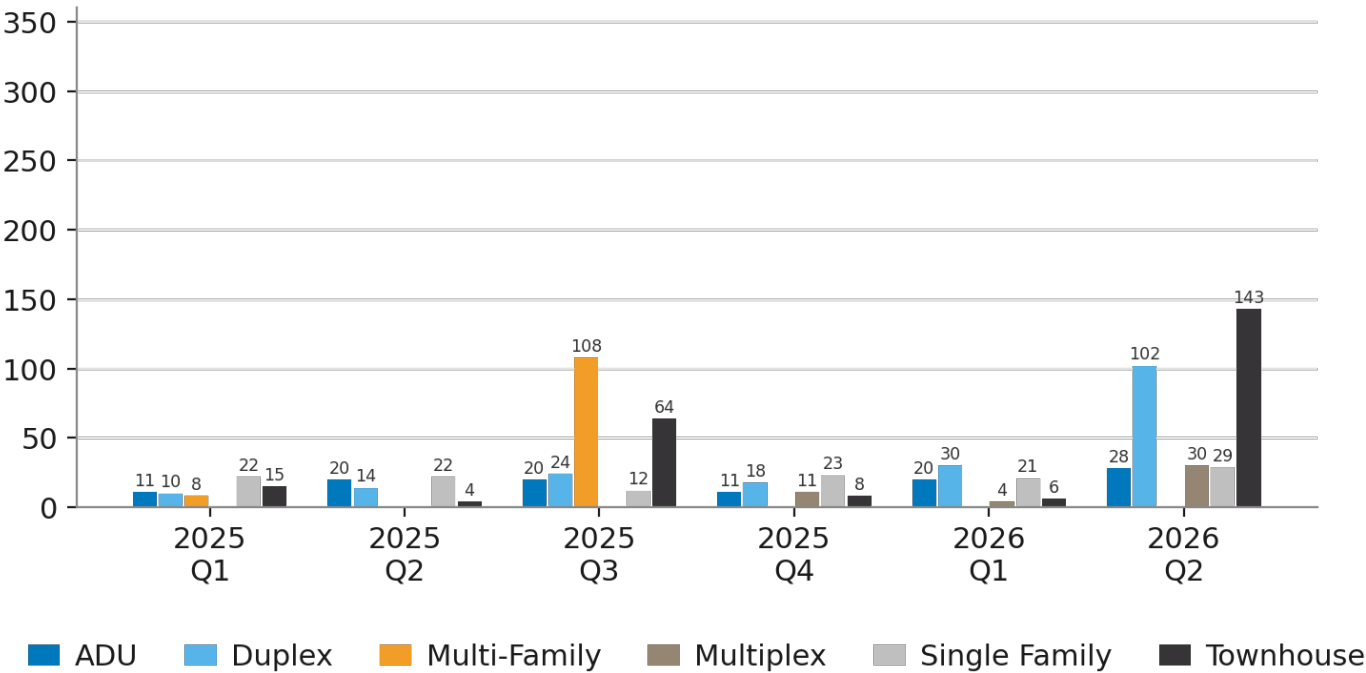
Did zoning reform change what is being built?

Single-family homes and ADUs remain the most common permit types, as they were already available before the zoning change. Townhouses and duplexes are generating the most new units, supporting increased housing density.

Pre-Approved DADU Plans

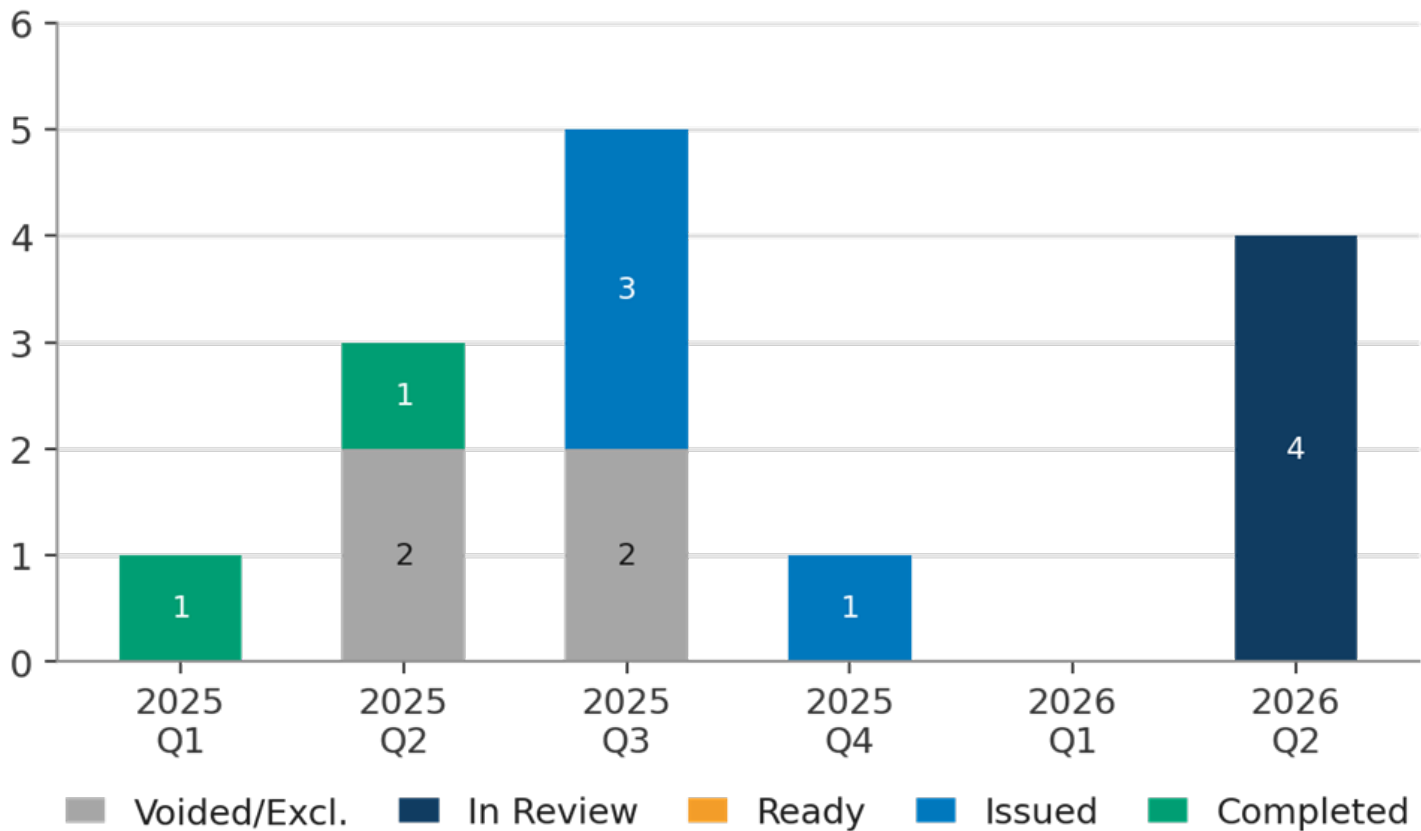
Pre-approved DADU plans are City-approved detached ADU designs that make building an ADU faster and less expensive.

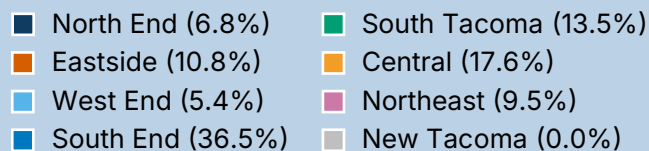
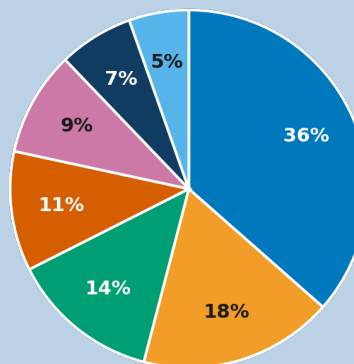
Pre-Approved DADU Plans by Status & Quarter



Where is new development happening in Tacoma?

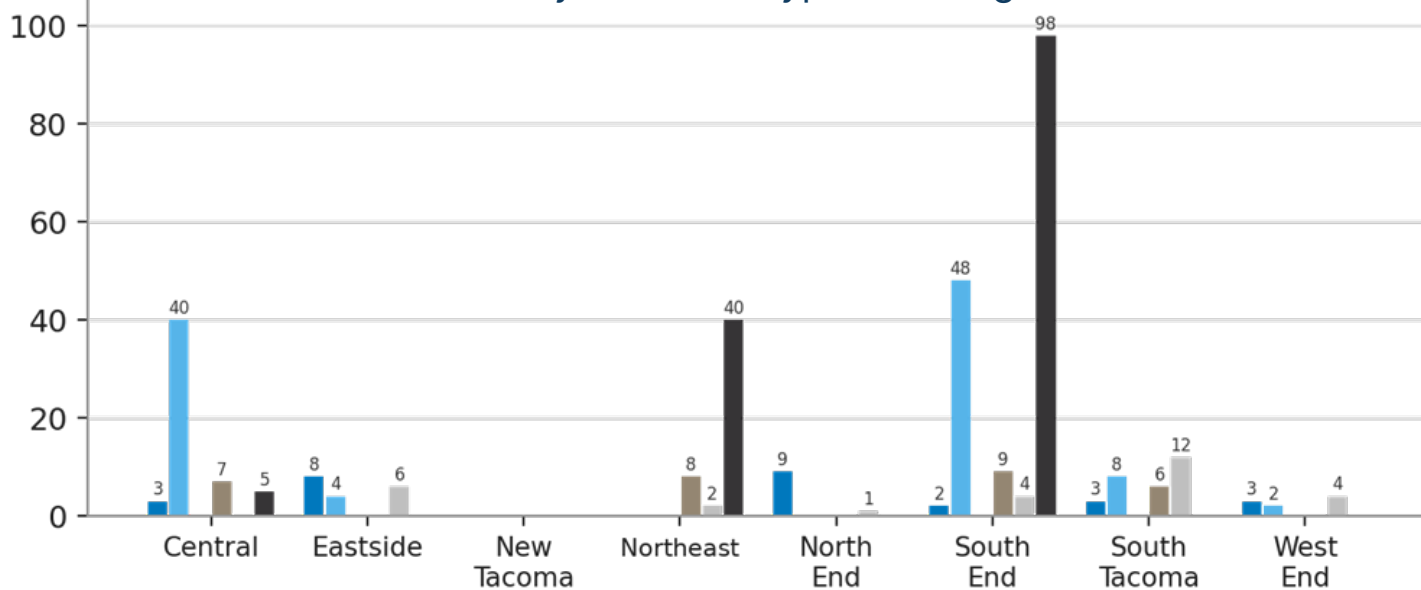
The majority of Q2 activity is in the South End, Central, and South Tacoma. This is a shift from Year One, where the majority of permits were located in the North End and Eastside.

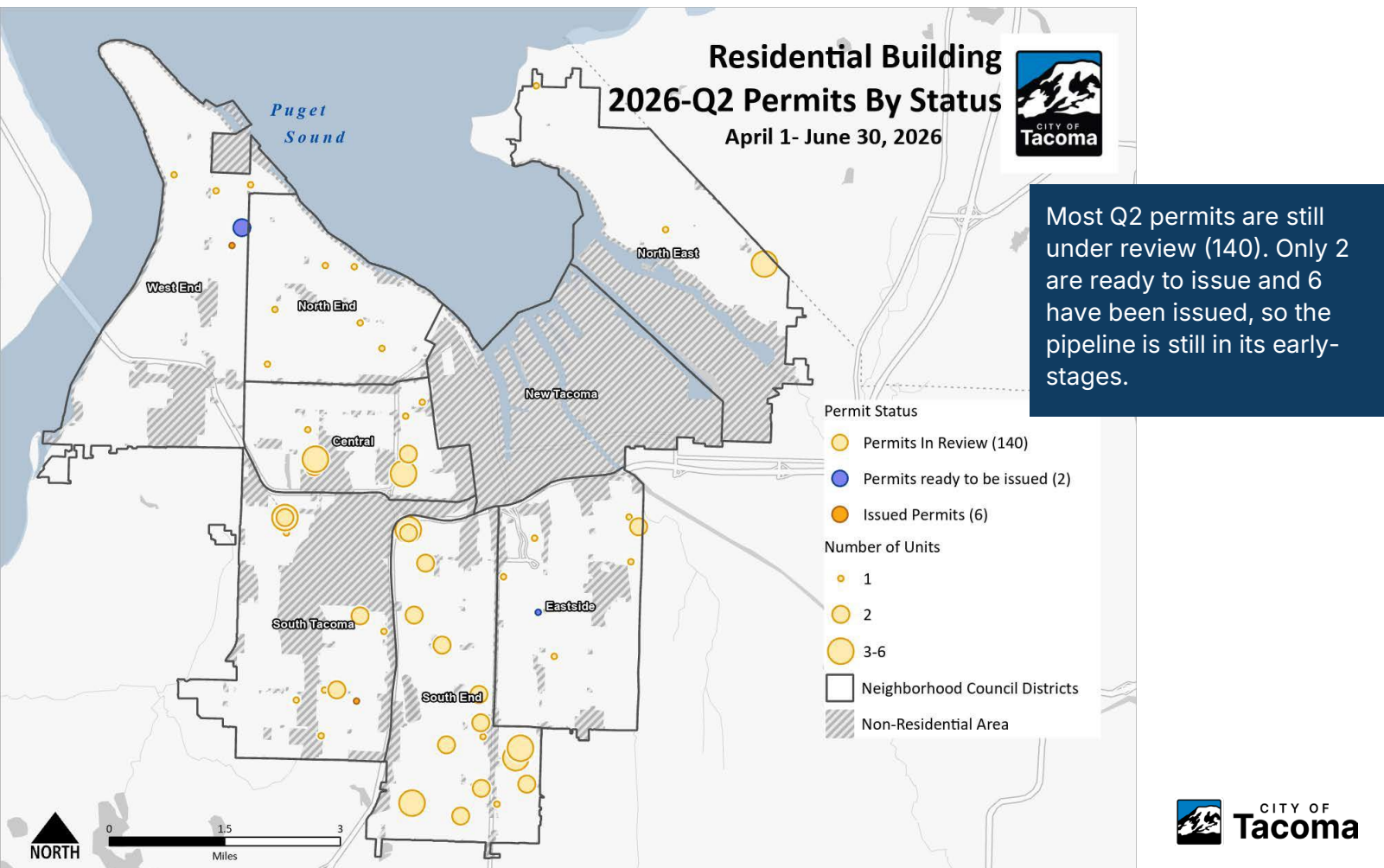
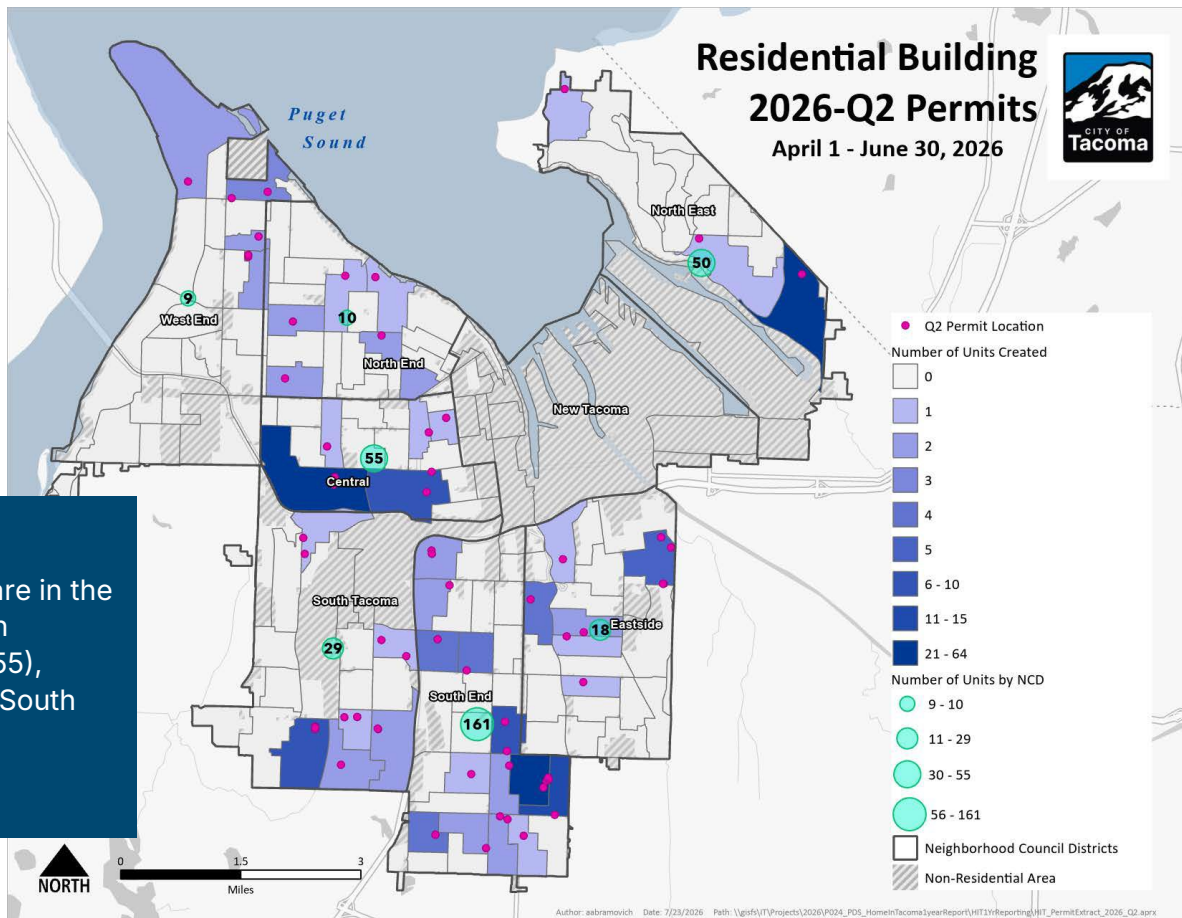
Total Number of Permits by Neighborhood (Q2 2026)

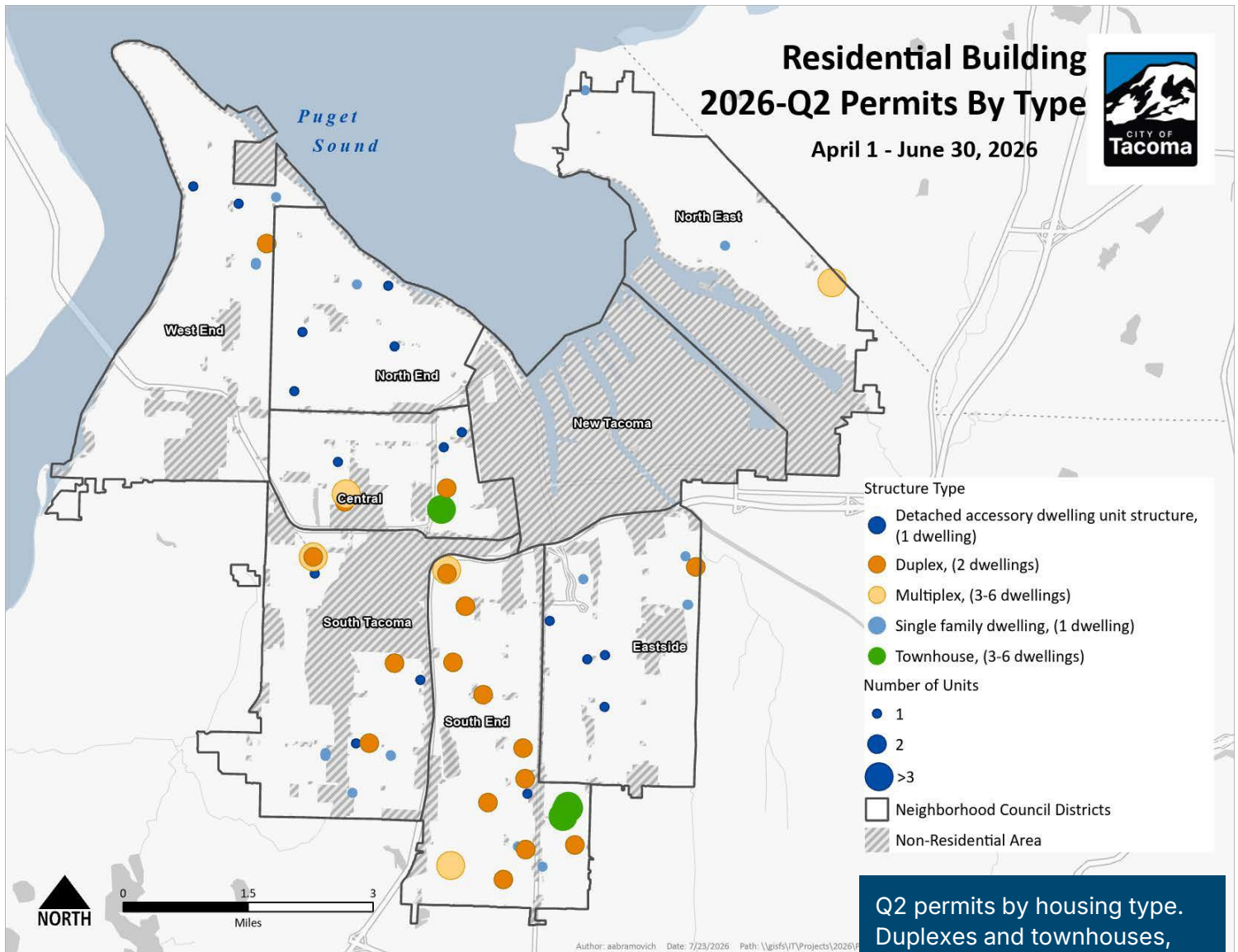


When looking at development activity by neighborhood, the **South End has the largest share of permits (36.5%)**.

Total Number of Units by Structure Type and Neighborhood (Q2 2026)

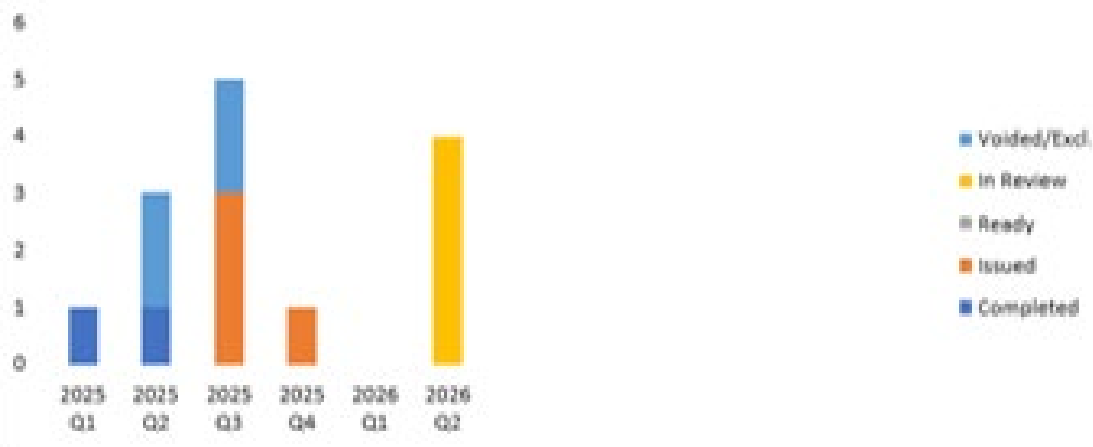






Q2 permits by housing type. Duplexes and townhouses, the biggest unit drivers, cluster in the South End, Central, and South Tacoma; ADUs and single-family permits are spread more evenly citywide.

What the Q2 2026 data is showing us:



Q2 2026 was the strongest quarter yet: 148 permit applications for 332 units, the most since Home in Tacoma took effect.



Units per application rose to 2.2, continuing the shift toward higher-density housing.



Townhouses and duplexes drove the quarter, together making up about three-quarters of new units.



Activity shifted south this quarter, led by the South End, Central, and South Tacoma.



Most Q2 permits are still early in the pipeline (140 of 148 in review), so these units will be delivered over the coming quarters.

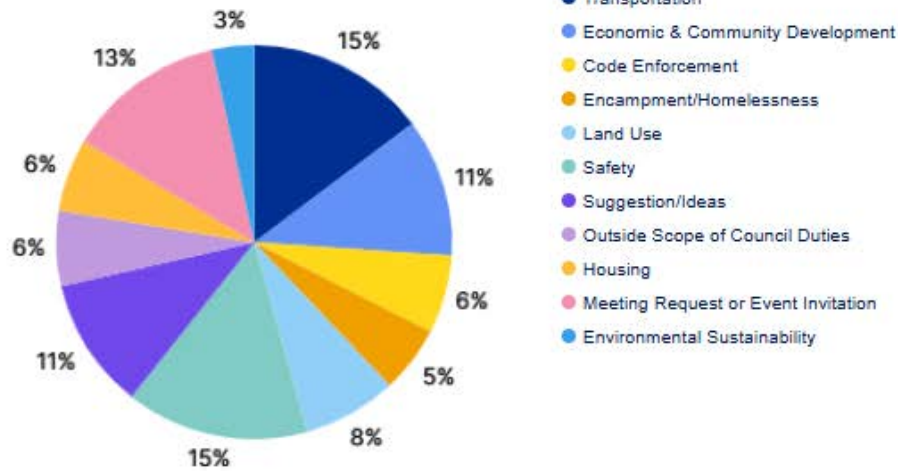

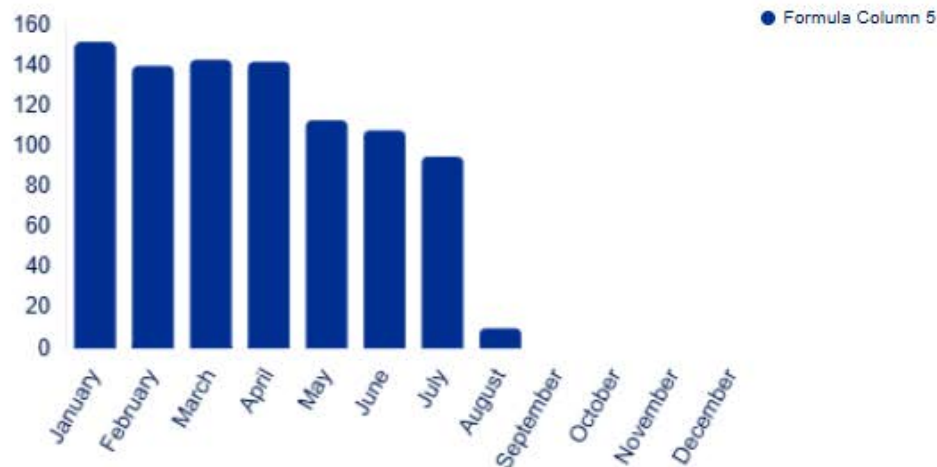

I ask for your support for a resolution authorizing the one-time use of Council Contingency Funds, in the amount of \$3,000, to sponsor the memorial service for former Mayor of Tacoma, Mike Crowley.

LEGISLATIVE INTENT:

Mike Crowley served on the Tacoma City Council starting in 1994 and was appointed Mayor in 2001. Much of his tenure in service was focused on revitalizing the city's downtown core, including championing the construction of the Greater Tacoma Convention Center.

The family of the late Mayor Crowley would like to conduct a community celebration at the Greater Tacoma Convention Center for an estimated 300+ friends, family, civic leaders, and community members. The Convention Center is prepared to host the event rent free, but the estimated actual costs for labor and equipment will be approximately, \$3,000-\$5,000, depending on final celebration details.

This resolution will allocate up to \$5,000 in Council Contingency Funds to support the community celebration. Funds will only be expended to cover actual costs connected with the event. Additional private funding will also be solicited and will be used to pay expenses prior to Council Contingency Funds.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ (CUSTOMER RESEARCH):

The family of Mike Crowley requested support through Mayor Ibsen's office. The City Manager confirmed date availability and estimated costs for use of the Convention Center with the Tacoma Venues and Events team. 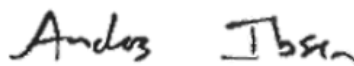

I ask for your support for a resolution authorizing the flying a commemorative flag to recognize the 10th year of the Association of Washington Business's Manufacturing Week Bus Tour from September 30, 2026 to October 7, 2026.

LEGISLATIVE INTENT:

In 2025, the City Council passed Resolution 41642, which created a new policy on commemorative flag displays at City Facilities. To request a flag be flown at City facilities that were not pre-approved as a part of the resolution, Council sponsors must either bring forward a resolution or a motion to request a flag be flown.

A commemorative flag raising provides an opportunity for the City of Tacoma to recognize and commemorate the values of the Tacoma City Council and Tacoma residents. The Association of Washington Business (AWB) annual Manufacturing Week bus tour and video series raises awareness of the important role manufacturing plays in our state, and supports the successful growth of our state's manufacturing sector as we work towards achieving the goal of doubling manufacturing in Washington by 2031. It shines a spotlight on Washington's makers and calls attention to ways policymakers, economic development groups, chamber of commerce leaders and others can support manufacturers.

The City of Tacoma works with community partners like the Economic Development Board and the South Sound Manufacturing Industrial Council to promote and enhance a positive business climate for manufacturing and related industries while remaining dedicated to safeguarding and improving people's lives, creating a sustainable environment, and providing the jobs that anchor Washington's economy.

The manufacturing sector provides high-paying, skilled, and fulfilling jobs for engineers, computer programmers, project managers, researchers, and others that are vital to the community and contribute to equitable economic development. Manufacturing is a major employer and job

creator in Washington State, with over 275,000 workers responsible for more than 8 percent of gross state product, and over 17,000 individuals working in the manufacturing sector in Pierce County. Manufacturing in Tacoma produces such varied products as aircraft components, precision robotics, batteries, components for the maritime industry, and craft beverages. Local manufacturing businesses lead the way in sustainable efforts to reduce energy and carbon emissions, such as the Port of Tacoma's Clean Air Strategy to reach zero emissions by 2040.

Recognizing the 10th year of the Manufacturing Week Bus Tour through a commemorative flag raising aligns with the City's practice of acknowledging moments, institutions, and symbols that reflect shared values, regional pride, and community cohesion. This ceremonial recognition is intended as a one-time observance connected to a milestone achievement.

Whenever a commemorative flag is displayed per the policy, it should be displayed at the following four locations:

- The Tacoma Municipal Building North (733 Market Street);
- The Tacoma Dome (2727 East "D" Street);
- The Tacoma Police Department Headquarters (3701 South Pine Street);
- The Tacoma Fire Department Headquarters (901 Fawcett Avenue).

The Association of Washington Business will procure commemorative flags for each location

DESIRED RESOLUTION DATE: August 25, 2026

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ (CUSTOMER RESEARCH):

Formal community engagement was not conducted for this commemorative flag-raising request, as the action is ceremonial only. The one-time flag raising is intended as a symbolic gesture acknowledging a moment of regional significance rather than a decision requiring public input.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:

Equity and Accessibility:

The proposed commemorative flag raising aligns with the City of Tacoma's Equity Framework by supporting community belonging, shared identity, and inclusive civic recognition. As a ceremonial, one-time observance, the action does not create barriers to access, impose costs, or result in disparate impacts across communities identified in Tacoma's Equity Index. The recognition reflects a broadly shared regional moment that brings together residents across neighborhoods, cultures, and backgrounds in a way that supports social cohesion and inclusive civic participation.

By celebrating a positive, shared community moment, the commemorative flag raising supports civic pride and social cohesion, which contribute to improved perceptions of safety and overall quality of life. Following the approval of this resolution staff will facilitate the raising of the flag at approved locations per the 2025 commemorative flag raising policy.

SPONSOR RECOMMENDATION:

We recommend adoption of this resolution to share in commemorating the City's efforts to promote and enhance a positive business climate for manufacturing and related industries while remaining dedicated to safeguarding and improving people's lives, creating a sustainable environment, and providing the jobs that anchor Washington's economy.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is not direct fiscal impact to the city for procuring and raising the flags. Per the commemorative flag policy and timing of this resolution, the flags can be raised and lowered when most convenient to staff that does not require overtime.

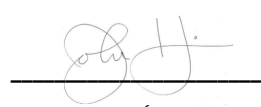
