ITEMS OF INTEREST

1. Artwork installation in Council Chambers: In **partnership with Environmental Services (ES), the Arts and Cultural Vitality Division** is excited to install a **new artwork in Council Chambers**. The artwork, titled *Our Fellow Creatures*, was created by local artist Teruko Nimura while she was serving as Artist in Residence with ES Solid Waste from 2024-2025. The piece features Tacoma's iconic Giant Pacific Octopus in hand-drawn ink and was developed as part of a custom Tidy Up Tacoma garbage can wrap. To create the wrap, Nimura layered the drawing on top of cyanotypes depicting a week of landfill-bound waste, highlighting the connections between individual waste habits, environmental stewardship, and the health of Tacoma's waterways. The artwork underscores the City's "If it Hits the Ground, it Hits the Sound" campaign and reflects collaboration between Arts, Solid Waste, and Stormwater. While there is only one individual octopus there are also eight arms amongst the waves, representing the power of the individual along with the power of community, and the strength embodied in connecting the two. Our *Fellow Creatures* will be installed in Council Chambers Friday, July 17 and recognized at the July 21 City Council meeting.
2. Solid Waste Fleet Air Emissions Reductions: **Solid Waste Management (SWM)** has been working on **reducing the vehicle air emissions** from Solid Waste operations **in alignment with the City's Climate Action Plan and the SWM Environmental and Sustainability Management System (ESMS)**. In 2019, SWM developed a goal within the ESMS with the objective of reducing the CO2 air emissions of the SWM Fleet by 25%. We have now achieved and substantially exceeded our 25% CO2 reduction goal for the SWM fleet. By the end of 2025, tailpipe emissions were reduced by 98% and lifecycle (well to wheel) emissions were reduced by 206% compared to the 2019 baseline.

These reductions reflect significant fleet modernization. Since 2015, 72% of the collection and transfer fleet now operates on compressed natural gas (CNG), and we are exploring additional opportunities for conversion. Due to new developments in CNG engine technology, we were able to purchase a CNG transfer truck. It has been in service for three months with good results. We are in the process of purchasing 3 additional CNG transfer trucks that will replace diesel trucks and have the potential to be able to expand more in the future. In October of 2024, we experienced a significant drop in our CO2 emissions when we transitioned to renewable natural gas (RNG). RNG is natural gas that is reclaimed methane from farms that would otherwise escape into the atmosphere, as opposed to CNG which is a fossil fuel.

Parallel to our efforts to convert diesel trucks to natural gas, we have also sought out opportunities to electrify our fleet. As of now, we have 21 fully electric vehicles that range from passenger vehicles to supervisor trucks, delivery vans, and a yard hostler. Recently, we received our first electric garbage truck, a rear loader. The new EV garbage truck is expected to go into service in the coming weeks and will provide us data that will help us determine how we can expand this technology.

Lastly, for our remaining diesel vehicles in the fleet, we now exclusively use R99, a 99% renewable form of diesel, and have been doing so for over 5 years. R99 does not significantly lower CO2 emissions, however it does lower other greenhouse gasses, carbon, and diesel particulate matter, and is not a fossil fuel. Engine manufacturers continue to adhere to EPA mandates and are constantly improving diesel aftertreatment systems. Because of this, new diesel trucks reduce their CO2 emissions by about 1 to 3% every 2 years.

Through these combined efforts, we have met and exceeded our CO2 emissions reduction goal. We will continue to record data and monitor our progress, and we will continue to seek out and implement new carbon CO2 reducing technologies as they become available.

3. City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance: The City posts weekly information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current census, number of available beds, and exits to housing. **This information can be found at:** <https://cms.tacoma.gov/ncs/weeklydataupdate.pdf> and is updated weekly.

4. Encampment Outreach: For the week of **July 6, 2026 – July 10, 2026**, HEAL team visited **14 different locations**. This resulted in **38 (12 new, and 26 repeats)** individuals contacted and referred to community services. Additionally, from this week's outreach, 16 people were interested in shelter specific services; 3 individuals were placed into shelter and HEAL will continue to work with 13 more individuals to find available shelter beds that best meets the individual's needs. 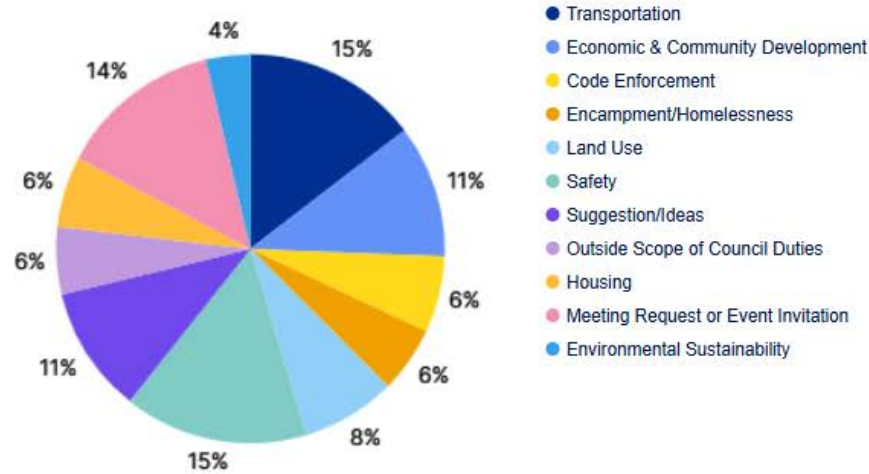

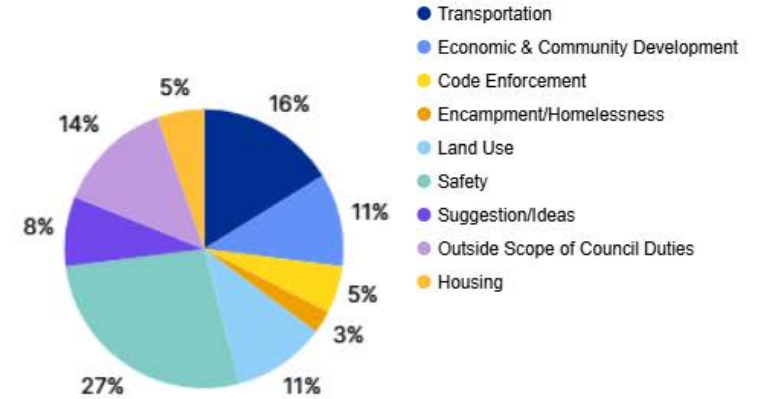

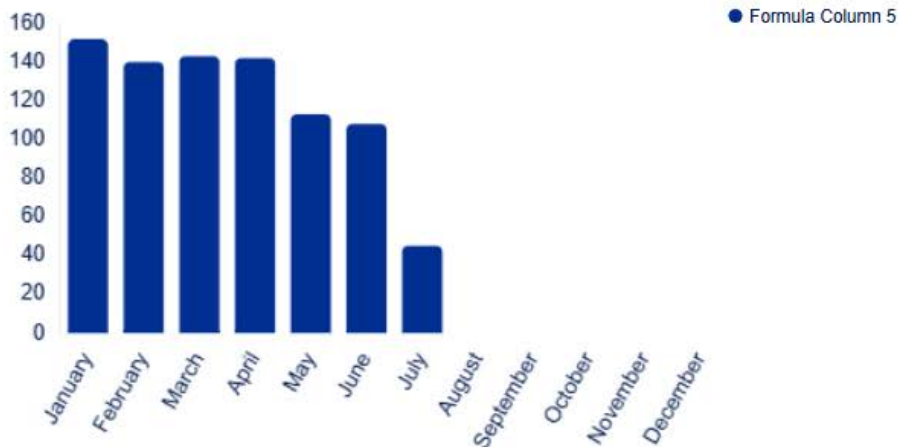

DATE: July 15, 2026

I ask for your support for a Council Consideration Request of \$1,225 to fund production and installation of up to three wayfinding signs near E. 56th and Portland Ave for the Eastside Community Center.

LEGISLATIVE INTENT:

The Eastside Community Center is more than a recreation facility. It is a cornerstone of Tacoma's Eastside community. Built through years of grassroots advocacy and a shared commitment to creating a safe and welcoming place for youth and families, the center reflects the resilience, strength, and aspirations of a neighborhood that worked tirelessly to secure greater access to quality public amenities. Since opening in 2018, it has become a hub for health, learning, recreation, and connection, serving thousands of residents each month through its pool, gymnasium, fitness center, youth and teen programs, senior services, arts programming, and community gathering spaces. As demand for these resources continues to grow, expanding access to the Eastside Community Center represents an investment in the well being, safety, and future of the entire community. Ensuring that more residents can benefit from this vital public resource will strengthen neighborhood connections, improve health outcomes, and continue the vision that brought the center to life.

The Eastside Community Center is accessed from E. 56th Street directly east of Portland Avenue behind a crop of trees that hide the view of the building from drivers down the main Portland Avenue thoroughfare. This resolution authorizes funds and directs the City Manager to install three wayfinding signs around this intersection to direct visitors to the community centers. The City's Public Works Street Operations provided the cost estimation used for this request.

DESIRED RESOLUTION DATE: August 4, 2026

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ (CUSTOMER RESEARCH):

This request came directly from Eastside community members who have missed the turnoff for the Eastside Community Center. Drivers passing by 56th Street and Portland Avenue see signs for First Creek Middle School and not the Eastside Community Center. Parks Tacoma expressed support and excitement for the installation of these wayfinding signs. Parks Tacoma's long-term goal is to identify funds to erect a monument sign on the corner similar to signs identifying other community centers. The wayfinding signs were identified as a great start.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:**Equity and Accessibility:**

Located in a very low-equity area of the City of Tacoma, the Eastside Community Center advances equity by intentionally addressing long standing disparities in access to recreation, health, education, and community resources in one of Tacoma's historically underserved neighborhoods. It serves East Tacoma, a minority majority area of Tacoma, and is within walking distance of the Salishan neighborhood, which is recognized as one of the most culturally, linguistically, and racially diverse communities in Pierce County. The Eastside Community Center also serves as a dedicated Senior Hub in a strategic partnership between the City and Parks Tacoma.

Increase the availability and accessibility of early childhood education programs.

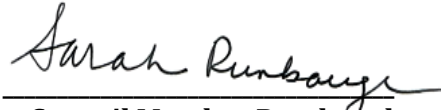

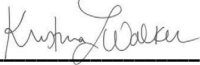

I ask for your support for a Council Contingency Expenditure of \$15,000 in support of St. Leo Food Connection’s pilot partnership with the Tacoma Public Library.

LEGISLATIVE INTENT:

This resolution will allocate \$15,000 in Council contingency funds to support St. Leo Food Connection’s pilot partnership with the Tacoma Public Library. Funding will be used to purchase food and snacks for distribution through the library-based programs, expanding access to food for children and families while evaluating the effectiveness of this community-based service model.

As discussions regarding this pilot partnership occurred after St. Leo Food Connection finalized its FY 2026–2027 operating budget, this pilot is not included in its budget. An allocation of \$15,000 provides the flexibility needed to implement and evaluate this pilot. These funds can be used retroactively to support the 2026 pilot or continuation of the pilot into 2027. This support would serve as an important demonstration of local investment, strengthening St. Leo Food Connection's ability to secure additional funding to sustain and expand its network of neighborhood-based food access programs beyond the pilot period.

Background

St. Leo Food Connection, established in 1982 as a ministry of St. Leo Parish, is one of the largest providers of supplemental food assistance in Pierce County. While many residents recognize the organization's downtown food bank, St. Leo Food Connection operates a network of neighborhood-based programs: mobile food banks, pop-up pantries, high school pantry-style delivery programs, a weekend Backpack Program serving over 72,000 student backpacks per school year, and a Summer Meals Program that provides daily lunches at 16 community sites.

Demand for food assistance has increased following reductions to federal SNAP benefits that began in 2025. Over the past year, visits to St. Leo Food Connection's mobile food bank sites increased by 44 percent. The Backpack Program grows annually by 6 to 10 percent. This year’s Summer Feeding Program started with an 80% increase in children served and six new sites. At IDEA High School, participation in the pantry-style delivery program doubled between 2025 and 2026 and served approximately one-quarter of the school’s student population in that school year.

Recognizing an increasing need for accessible food resources for children and families, Councilmember Rumbaugh engaged in discussions with St. Leo Food Connection regarding

opportunities to expand services in Tacoma leading to a pilot partnership between St. Leo Food Connection and the Tacoma Public Library. Library staff had identified a growing need for food among youth visiting library branches and had been purchasing snacks with their own resources to support children experiencing food insecurity.

As a result of this collaboration, St. Leo Food Connection has launched a pilot partnership with Tacoma Public Library that includes serving Summer Meals at the Main Library, providing healthy snacks at three library branches, and exploring the feasibility of a pop-up pantry at the Main Library to increase access to nutritious food for children and families.

DESIRED RESOLUTION DATE: August 4, 2026

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ (CUSTOMER RESEARCH):

Ensuring food access has always been a priority for the Tacoma community, but since the COVID pandemic the need for food access has skyrocketed. This need has exacerbated in recent years as federal funding cuts have impacted our food providers. Sponsors have met with community partners and nonprofit organizations to learn about Pierce County's food distribution systems and brainstorm ways to provide food primarily to children in safe spaces where children already spend time.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:

Equity and Accessibility:

According to St. Leo's Food connection, childhood hunger is a devastating condition that pervades our community. At many of our schools, more than 80% of children rely on Free and Reduced Meals programs to get the nutrition they need. Tacoma Public Schools has offered free lunches to all students since 2022 under the Community Eligibility Provision of the USDA because the need is so high. Free breakfast and lunch during the school year is not just helpful to low-income families, but to ALICE families (asset limited, income constrained, employed) and amplifies the need for free summer meals.

Livability: *Equity Index Score:* Moderate Opportunity

Improve health outcomes and reduce disparities, in alignment with the community health needs assessment and CHIP, for all Tacoma residents

Increase positive public perception of safety and overall quality of life.

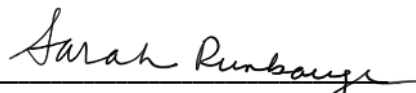
