A Sister City designation between Tacoma and Kochi is grounded in shared strengths, complementary priorities, and the potential for meaningful long-term collaboration. Both are diverse coastal cities with robust port operations, growing creative economies, and strong commitments to sustainability and community-driven development. Establishing this relationship would expand Tacoma's global engagement, help the Sister Cities

Council deepen its regional and international networks, and create new pathways for cultural, educational, and economic exchange.

For the City of Tacoma and its community partners, this relationship offers opportunities to learn from Kochi's innovations in creative economy, smart-city planning, climate resilience, tourism development, and multicultural arts programming. Likewise, Kochi benefits from Tacoma's leadership in port modernization, environmental stewardship, and community-based innovation. Local organizations—including schools, universities, arts groups, and business associations—can gain access to new partnerships, joint projects, and exchange opportunities that broaden global awareness and strengthen international cooperation.

Mutual areas of strength and interest include maritime industries, climate adaptation, clean energy, cultural festivals, creative arts, entrepreneurship, youth development, and equitable urban planning. The designation would serve as a catalyst for community connection, economic growth, and shared learning—enhancing both cities' ability to foster global citizenship and sustainable progress. Syed K Jamal and Clare Petrich visited Kochi in November of 2024 and signed an MoU with the City of Kochi through its Mayor, and built a strong foundation for future partnerships.

Tacoma-Kochi Committee has already hosted Tacoma's first Festival of Light to bring the Tacoma community together with cultural events, kids' activities, a community fashion show, and many educational and cultural workshops. With grants from Tacoma Creates and Graduate Tacoma, and support from several sponsors such as Parks Tacoma and Pierce Transit, we have already produced an outcome that has made a huge community impact through cross cultural programming and community development.

### Areas of mutual interest upon which the relationship will focus:

The relationship between Tacoma and Kochi can focus on several areas of mutual interest that benefit both communities. Collaboration in port management and maritime industries can strengthen trade, innovation, and sustainability practices. Cultural and educational exchanges offer opportunities for students and artists to deepen global understanding. Both cities can share strategies on climate resilience, waterfront development, and green infrastructure. Partnerships in technology, tourism, and small-business development can further stimulate economic growth. By building on these shared priorities, Tacoma and Kochi can develop a dynamic, long-term relationship that supports learning, cultural connection, and sustainable progress for both cities.

# Opportunities for new activities and potential outcomes.

New activities between Tacoma and Kochi could include joint creative economy projects including films, port-technology pilot projects, climate-resilience workshops, student and teacher exchanges, culinary and cultural festivals, and collaborative tourism campaigns. Entrepreneurship programs, particularly in maritime innovation, clean energy, and digital services, could foster shared economic growth. Potential outcomes include creative coproductions, stronger trade relationships, improved port efficiency, expanded cultural awareness, and increased tourism. Educational partnerships may produce globally

skilled students, while environmental cooperation could lead to shared best practices in coastal protection and sustainable development. Overall, these activities can create a lasting, mutually beneficial partnership that enhances economic vitality, cultural understanding, and community resilience.

The Sister Cities Council and the partnering organizations can expect several benefits and measurable results from establishing a Tacoma–Kochi relationship. Tacoma-Kochi Committee is making plans on those outcomes through community gatherings, public reading and screening sessions.

Kochi—often called the "Queen of the Arabian Sea"—is a major port city on India's southwest coast and a cultural and economic hub of the state of Kerala. Known for its long maritime history, Kochi has been shaped by centuries of global trade with Arab, Chinese, Portuguese, Dutch, and British merchants. This rich heritage makes it a natural partner for Tacoma, another diverse port city with strong international ties.

Kochi's economy centers on shipping, logistics, fisheries, information technology, tourism, and a fast-growing startup ecosystem. The Cochin Port, one of India's largest, supports robust trade and maritime innovation. The city is also home to the Kochi Metro, the Kochi Smart City project, and several universities and research institutions, reflecting its commitment to sustainable urban development and technological progress.

Culturally, Kochi is renowned for its vibrant arts community, including the Kochi-Muziris Biennale—one of Asia's most important contemporary art festivals. Historic neighborhoods such as Fort Kochi showcase unique architecture, multicultural heritage, and diverse culinary traditions. The city also emphasizes environmental stewardship through backwater conservation, mangrove restoration, and climate-resilience initiatives.

As a sister city, Kochi offers Tacoma opportunities for collaboration in port management, clean energy, arts and culture, tourism promotion, entrepreneurship, and education. Both cities share common priorities in sustainability, global engagement, and community-driven innovation, making Kochi a strong and complementary partner for Tacoma's international outreach.
